
St Francis Celebration

As you are all aware the new school cross has brought us great joy this year. The Cross of San Damiano was the cross at which St. Francis prayed when God called on him to rebuild His church. During the year the children have shown great interest in and devotion to the cross. Earlier we had a visit from Sr. Anastasia, a Franciscan nun based in Knock. Sr. Anastasia lent to us a first class relic of St. Francis of Assisi. Not a day has passed without requests for the relic from within the wider community. Ms. Dempsey has been taking care of the relic and she is astounded by the route it has travelled as it passed through the hands of those in need. The relic seemed to take on a life of its own and navigate its own path. It may have been borrowed in order to bless a sick relative or friend, but always went to others as well, leaving great calm and serenity in its wake. The children in school were all fascinated by the relic too. They had studied St. Francis. Mrs. Colleary's fifth class had learned the canticle of the sun and prepared art work based on this. Somewhere along the way, the idea was conceived of having a special school Novena to St. Francis. The daily prayers were displayed on the noticeboard outside school and recited each day by the children. The next logical step was the Mass, which took place in the parish Church on May 25th. First Holy Communion



End of Year Tests. Reports due in June!!

At the end of each school year children from first class upwards complete standardised tests. The tests used are the Sigma-T Maths Test, the Micra-T English Test and in senior classes, the Drumcondra English Reading Test. Standardised tests in English reading and maths measure your child's achievement compared to other children in all schools at the same class or age level. School test results are submitted to the Department of Education at the end of 2nd, 4th and 6th classes. Standardised tests are not the only way of gathering information about a child's learning. The diagram below shows how the teacher uses many different ways to build a picture of your child's learning during the year. The teacher uses the information gathered to celebrate your child's achievements and to plan the next steps needed to build on progress made.



People often wonder what the scores in standardised tests mean. The scores recorded are **STen Scores**. The teacher used STen scores to tell you how your child did in the tests. STen scores go from 1 to 10. The table below describes what the different STen scores tell you about your child's achievement in the tests.

STen Scores	What does the STen Score mean?	Proportion of children with this score.
8 – 10	Well above average	1/6 or almost 17%
7	High average	1/6 or almost 17%
5 – 6	Average	1/3 or almost 34%
4	Low average	1/6 or almost 17%
1 - 3	Well below average	1/6 or almost 17%

If your child's STen score is between 5 and 6 for example, you will know that his/her performance on the test is average. The table shows that about one in every three children in Ireland have STen scores in this range. You can also see that some children have STen scores above and below the average. Scores for children with English as an additional language may not always reflect progress being made in class. Similar care is needed when interpreting scores for children with special educational needs. As with other tests your child does in school, the score on a standardised test can be affected by how he/she feels on the test day or by worry or excitement about a home or school event. This means that each test score is an indication of your child's achievement. Remember that you play an important role in encouraging and supporting your child regardless of test results.

The National Council for Curriculum and Assessment (NCCA) has developed some online resources to help you to support your child's learning in primary school. Many of these are available in various languages and new resources are regularly added to the parents' page at www.ncca.ie/parents.




Desk to 3K Challenge
